From the May 14, 1948 Herald

The work of tearing down the structure, where Garber's "new supermarket" started May 1948.

The old frame building started before 1890. Previous occupants included Dr. Zach Whitmire, who had his office in the original small room facing the street. Afterwards it was the home Mr. and Mrs. George Shetterly who had a millinery parlor in the front. Fred Grob later opened a grocery store in the front, which was later enlarged by doubling the size of the one story front room. Several years later Mr. Grob sold to A.W. Garber and Ed Bachman, who operated as G&B Company, and added more room. Mr. Garber built a concrete locker building at the rear, to which the new store was attached.

Joseph was born in Prussia, Germany and at the age of six years came to the new world with his parents.

In 1863 he married Emma Young in Peoria, who lived but a few years. In 1869 he married Miss Catherine Kallista. Twelve children were born to them.

Joseph attended school in Peoria and at the age of eleven commenced learning the butcher's trade. In 1869 he opened a successful meat market in Metamora. Besides his business, he owned about 200 acres in and near the city and also dealt in livestock.
