"Standard Schools"

Between 1914 and 1918, there were eighty-six "Standard Schools" built in Woodford County. Each one was alike.



School Map above right: 41 - Hazel Dell; 42 - Morsetown; 43 - Harmony; 62 - Mt. Pleasant; 63 - Lowell; 64 - Metamora; 65 - Engel; 71 - Maple Grove; 72 – Happy Hour (Poor Farm); 73 – Tomb. Most of the rural schools were phased out by 1951. In 1890, 20% of the students were foreign-born.





How Many Questions Did You Get Right...?

If your answers are within 5 years, give yourself an "A"

- 1. Original library was founded in 1857. It contained 1,200 volumes.
- The Illinois Prairie District Library was founded in 1950. Today it has 6 branches in Metamora, Germantown Hills, Spring Bay, Washburn, Roanoke, and Benson.
- 3. Adlai Stevenson practiced law in Metamora from 1859-1869. He lived at the southwest corner of Menard and Walnut (the current home of the Metamora Association for Historic Preservation.
- 4. Electricity came to Metamora in 1908. Lights were only available from evening to midnight. A controversy developed with the farmers east of town who had their own exchange in Cazenovia were asked to pay a fee to connect to the Metamora system.
- 5. The streets around the Square were paved with brick in 1914 at a cost of \$15,257.60. A grand celebration including a 40-car parade around the Square, a dance, and a band concert was held when the project was completed.
- 6. Peter Sommers installed a telephone system around 1907.
- 7. Trick question! Hanover College was organized in 1837. But it did not survive the financial panic of that year.
